### **Father Lameck**

For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given (Isaiah 9:6)



Many people ask, "What is there to be merry about, with wars and terrorism, crime at an all-time

high, marriages breaking up and drugs all over our cities?".

Yet it was at such a time that our Lord Jesus Christ came into the world some 2,000 years ago, and it will be at such a time that Jesus Christ comes back to this earth. The angel on that first Christmas night said, "For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:11). If we believe this, then it makes all the difference in the world for us. Life takes on a new dimension.

There is one particular passage of Scripture in the Old Testament to which I often turn, not only at this time of the year but also at many times other than the Christmas season: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; Those who dwelt in the land of the shadow of death. Upon them a light has shined' (Isaiah 9:2). Scripture goes on to say; "For unto us a Child is born, Unto us a Son is given; And the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." When these words were uttered by the Prophet Isaiah, prophetic thunders were heard and the lightning of divine vengeance was seen as the clouds of judgment gathering. With a trumpet like voice this great statesman-prophet had declared with certainty the calamity which was soon to fall upon Judah as a judgment from God. But Isaiah saw far away at the horizon a rift in the clouds and a clear light

shining from heaven. He saw that while the people were walking in darkness, a light also shone upon them. He looked through the next 800 years of time and talked about the garments rolled in blood" (Isaiah 9:5,). Then he declared, "Unto us a Child is born, Unto us a Son is given" (Isaiah 9:6). The "Child born" and the "Son given" is called "Wonderful" because He is wonderful. We must never lose sight of the fact that as a Child He was born, and that as a Son He was given. He is a "Child born" with reference to His human nature and His being born of the virgin. But He is also a "Son given" with reference to His divine nature and His being God's Son. There is no doubt that He was the "Child born," but with equal certainty we need to declare that He was the "Son given." So when He was here in the flesh, "all the fullness of the Godhead" (Colossians 2:9V) continued to dwell in Him bodily. Therefore, as we approach this Christmas season, with our trust and faith in Christ, we hear the angel saying, "Do not be afraid' (Luke 2:10). The psalmist said, "The Lord is on my side; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" (Psalm 118:6). This is the Christmas message to you today. You, too, can appropriate the words to believers, words that are used all the way through the Scriptures: "Fear *not*, for I am with you" (Isaiah 43:5. A Child was born and a Son was given for our salvation. We have complete assurance that Jesus Christ is not only the Son of Man but also that He is the Son of God. And God has accepted what Jesus did on the cross and in the resurrection for our salvation. We trust in Him and Him alone for our forgiveness and for eternal life

## **Learn More About Your Church Finances**

Church funding is a mystery to many people. It is frequently assumed that the Church of England is funded by the government, or paid for nationally out of huge reserves. This is not the case and the truth is far more complicated. It is therefore

vital that time and effort is committed to reminding and advising people of the reality that the living Church has to fund itself. On the positive side, once people understand this simple fact they more readily appreciate the need to give generously and to ensure the continuation of ministry and mission.

The heart of the Church of England is its parishes. Parish finances are the responsibility of

the Parochial Church Council, which receives money in and pays money out.

Income arises from Sunday collections, online giving through an arranged standing order, legacies, funeral and wedding fees, etc. Expenditure includes building maintenance, ministry and mission, and parish share or quota. All these funds have to come from parishioners.
What is Parish Share and where does it come from?

Parish Share is the sum of money contributed by each parish every year to the diocese to support local ministry. The Common Fund is the total of all parish shares in the Diocese of Chester. Parish Share is not about our buildings; it is not even about our bishops. Rather, Parish Share funds the lion's share of the cost of our parish clergy as they serve in our parishes; the rest comes from wealthier dioceses who share their resources with us. We need to face a hard truth. Fifty years ago around three quarters of the cost of Anglican clergy was met by the Church Commissioners in London. Today much the same proportion is met by the faithful people in church on Sunday, Friends of the Church, legacies e.t.c. If we fail to pay our parish share, the diocese will subsequently withdraw the services of a resident priest in our parish and we begin to share a priest with another parish. The worst case scenario is the church is closed or transformed into a coffee shop.

Every parish contributes to this Parish Share/Common Fund and every parish also receives from the fund in the following ways:

- parish priest's monthly stipend
- clergy pension contribution
- National Insurance
- housing costs
- clergy training
- administration of the Diocese
- the wide range of diocesan support services e.g. the Education Department, which supports local Church and community schools.
- Parish Share is essential to the mission of the church in the diocese, without it clergy could not be supported. The Parish Share or Common Fund is the diocese's largest single income stream.

How is the Parish Share Calculated for each Parish?

The total amount of Parish Share required each year by the Diocese is divided between the parishes in a way that seeks to recognise the need for some parishes to be financially supported by others. How much each parish contributes is based on church membership and the socio-economic category of the parish, determined by the parish itself.

What Can You Do To Support

Each Sunday we celebrate (and receive afresh) His greatest gift in Jesus. God's abundance is for all. In difficult days no one in Israel went hungry as God fed His people with the manna; no one had too much. Giving is not always about money but every single gift that can sustain the life of your church. You may not be a regular church goer but you have the desire to support the existence of your local church. I urge you to become a 'Friend of the Church' where you can support through a one off annual donation. (contact the Rector or Chair of the Friends'. Rob Selby for more information on 01829 770586).

You may be a parishioner living in the village who would like to give monthly but have no time to come to church every Sunday. Get in touch with the Treasurer; Jane Richards on 0189 770482 who will give you a standing order form which allows you to contribute to the Parish Share even when you are away. 

It was judged on the use and enjoyment of the play equipment, the quality of the area, and the community involvement during the design and fundraising process. It was noted that it was free from litter and dog fouling. The third award was Runner up in the Best Kept Village Competition 2019. It was the first time for some years that Tattenhall, entered the competition and to get runner up in our category to Christleton was a great credit to everyone involved.

This was another huge community project and we would like to thank those who supported our

campaign which included litter picks and our successful 'Squirrel trail' raising money for the Air Ambulance.

With great sadness the Council heard that much

respected local resident, Margaret Thornton, who had spoken in 2012 at the CW&C Strategic Planning Meetings with elegance and passion, had sadly passed away. She would be a great loss to the community. It was noted that her funeral would take place on the 11th November

TATTENHALL

A resident again raised concerns about recent flooding affecting five of the six arterial roads into Tattenhall. A lack of effective and timely signage warning of the floods and offering diversions was noted as being hazardous to road users, especially after dark. These matters would be raised with Highways when a meeting could be arranged. It was suggested that the Parish Council request permanent flood warning signs be erected on roads subject to flooding.

More effective dropped kerbs and other concerns in respect of the state of some roads, were being considered.

The Neighbourhood plan review committee confirmed the members involved would include Parish Councillors, members of the community and local groups. The Chairman would thank Graham Spencer and Carol Weaver tor all their hard work on the Neighbourhood Plan following their decision to step down from the Review Committee.

Councillors were interested in setting up a Youth Council to encourage younger members of the community to become involved in local matters . please contact the Clerk if you would like more

information about this.

It was agreed to install a noticeboard in the brick bus shelter on Tattenhall Road, and the suggestion to streamline opening hours at the Refuse Centre would be followed up with CWaC.

It was confirmed that some gravel would be laid on muddy stretches of the Millennium Mile. Time and materials were kindly donated by one of the Councillors.

The Parish Council's future priorities would be considered at the December meeting. Residents and businesses were encouraged to attend the meeting, which would take place on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> December at 7.30pm at the Barbour Institute, to take part in the discussions.

Given a dwindling interest in the allotments, it was agreed that the rents would be frozenat the 2019-2020 levels - full plot £54.00, concession £32.40, half plot £37.00, concession £22.20.

With Christmas approaching there is lots of festive preparation underway for a number of community activities for the village to enjoy. Trees will be dressed and put up, along with wreaths on lamp posts. There will be a Lantern Parade and Children's Christmas Parties. 




