This year has been extremely challenging globally as a result of the pandemic. As we draw close to Christmas, most Christians will not be able to attend services or come together in person this Christmas. With what we have experienced so far, many people globally will be in hospitals and others in isolation. Just a few will be in the comfort of their homes but unable to visit or celebrate the Christmas that they have known over the years.

This however does not mean our Christmas celebration is going to be hopeless. As a church, we will be finding other ways to reach out to each other, with prayers and other kinds of support in our community. We will be using social media and other non-traditional methods to bring people together. We hear a lot about "flattening the curve" regarding Covid 19, using social distancing and stay-at-home orders to slow the rate of infection both to reduce casualties and to allow the health care system to more gradually absorb those who need care.

Jesus came into the world so that we might have life and have it to the fullest. He went about preaching and healing as signs of what was to come. He did not heal all the world's illnesses or raise all who were dying. His healing was a sign that there was something more — a kingdom not of this world, though while in this world, we are commissioned to create our own signs by helping foster life, a life to the fullest. Perhaps nothing speaks of the worst of the human condition more than war — when death is not only part of the story but the dominant theme, death that is not the unavoidable circumstances but the deliberately intended outcome. One of my favourite stories involves Christmas Eve in 1914, in the thick of World War I. British, French and German forces hunkered down on their respective sides during a lull in the fighting — undoubtedly frightened about what might come next. Suddenly, soldiers on one side heard singing of a Christmas carol from the ranks of their foes. Nervously, some of the soldiers on the other side joined in, and eventually there was widespread singing of Christmas carols, and eventually exchanges of gifts and an impromptu soccer game. If warring factions during a World War I battle can find a way to come together and celebrate Christmas, I think that all of us today, despite the shadow of COVID-19, can focus on the message of Jesus and his birth on Christmas Day. Thus, in this extraordinary time of Christmas, I wish for all of us to open our eyes and our hearts in order to recognise the many signs of life around us.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1:5)

DAVID JOHN THOMAS (1933-2020)

David was a proud Welshman but not overbearingly so. He was the life and soul of any party and adored by those who knew him. At the start of the Rugby Six Nations, he would quietly put the Welsh flag outside the front door until they eventually stood no hope and then equally quietly bring it back inside.

David's parents ran a family corner shop and Post Office in a small village outside Swansea where he was brought up. They were commended for bravery when they fended off 2 thieves, his mother hitting one with a flat iron and his father bringing the other to the ground with a true Welsh rugby tackle. David clearly inherited their strength of character.

David married Marilyn in 1958 and one year later, Amanda arrived. David elevated himself from the corner shop to become the Manager of Fine Fare, later Tesco, and was known for standing on a chair and auctioning turkeys to clear them at knock down prices just before Christmas. He and Marilyn shortly thereafter began working together by buying and converting a country house into a tea room which

became a well known restaurant and then opened another restaurant. Together they were not afraid of hard work with David always front of house charming the customers and Marilyn producing her excellent food in the kitchen.

In more recent years, David's quiet strength has brought him through 2 heart attacks, the passing of Marilyn and last year a severe illness from which he, against all odds, recovered again. He is now doing what he said he wanted to do and to be again with Marilyn....but he always has been

The November Zoom meeting started with the introduction and co-option of John Bailey onto the Parish Council. In the public participation part of the meeting, when anyone can address the council, the future of Huxley school, CWaC's planning portal and a hedge on Chester Road were discussed.

Items in the Actions part of the agenda included an update on the war memorial and the groundwork investigations following small sink holes which had appeared. The Highways department advised they would be carrying out a drain investigation.

The Parish council objected to the proposed closure of Huxley C of E primary school for various reasons including the loss of a valuable local resource, a lack of parental choice in the area, and that it would be premature as there had been an increase in the numbers of houses in the local area.

Two planning applications were discussed, both of which the Parish Council supported as both were compliant with the Neighbourhood Plan.

The use of S106 funding allocation was discussed, notably the provision of a MUGA (multi use games area) and a community orchard.

It had been reported to the clerk that there had been a lack of maintenance on Rean Meadow. The Clerk would follow this up with Redrow and CWaC.

The Spinney Project (Milbrook Nature Park) was discussed. The Clerk had received many messages of support for the project. It was decided that the PC was to have an EGM to discuss the ongoing project and grant funding. This would be held on 23rd November 2020 via Zoom.

There had been a few incidents of anti-social behaviour occurring in, on and around the youth shelter area. The local police had been informed, and would monitor the situation.

The Chairman thanked all for attending the virtual meeting, and set the date for the next monthly meeting on 7th December 2020, 1930 via Zoom.


