

# **Mothering Sunday 14th March**



March 14<sup>th</sup> will be the fourth Sunday of Lent this year when we should be lavishing our mums with attention and celebrating the women who have nurtured us throughout our lives.

Normally, at St Alban's Mothering Sunday Service we would be presenting posies of spring flowers to mums and grandmas, neighbours. This year, as times are different, there is a reminder of a beautiful flower arrangement dedicated to those who will be separated from their families this year as we pray for the time when we can all be reunited in love.

Historically, Mothering Sunday was the day when those working on wealthy estates and farms were given the day off to visit their families and attend their mother church. In modern times, it is a day when children give presents, flowers, and home-made cards to their mothers. This will be a Mothering Sunday like no other this year, as scores

of people self-isolate and are forced to rethink plans with loved ones. With the usual lunches and afternoon teas cancelled, what can people do instead to celebrate? As a church, we will be holding a virtual special Mothering Sunday Service on 14<sup>th</sup> March. You can listen to our service on our St Alban's website anytime on the above date. Perhaps you might think of surprising someone with some flowers and if the lockdown is still in place, simply knock the door and leave them on the door step.

Being in the middle of Lent, Mothering Sunday was also a "holiday" from abstinence and a traditional Simnel cake was baked and presented for afternoon tea with mum. The origin of the name "Simnel" is unclear, but the light fruit cake with a double layer of marzipan is yummy! There are traditionally 11 marzipan balls on the top. One for each of the loyal disciples (Judas is not counted).

# Simnel Cake Recipe



Ingredients
175g butter
175g soft brown
sugar
3 large eggs (beaten)
175g plain flour
½ tsp ground mixed
spice
400g of mixed fruit
Zest of a lemon
Marzipan
Apricot jam
Method
Preheat oven to
140C and grease and

Cream the butter and sugar and beat in eggs. Sift in flour and spices and add all ingredients. Put half the mix in the tin and carefully place a disc of marzipan on top before adding rest of cake mix. Bake for 1 3/4 hrs. When cooled brush with warmed jam and put a second disc of marzipan and decorate with 11 disciples on the top.

At times they have been exhausted and emotionally overwhelmed by the logistical challenges in rolling out (firstly) the increased flu vaccination programme and then the Covid vaccination programme, and all of this in covid-secure environments and wearing full PPE! They continue to be heartened by your support, your optimism, your heartfelt thanks and with the promise of further vaccines ahead.

Your Practices at Tattenhall and Farndon have remained 'open for business' throughout the pandemic; have continued to transform their services with telephone triage appointments,

video calls and annual reviews; continued to seek patient views (our second easy-to-use online Patient Survey takes place this Spring), and further developed local health and community services with the appointment of new Clinical Pharmacists, Social Prescribers, Medical Receptionists .. the list goes on. Your PPG has continued to hold Zoom meetings throughout (some of which are now open to a wider group within our community), and seeks to keep you informed through the VSG Website, the VSG Facebook Page or through Tattenhall Online. Working collaboratively with the Practice, the PPG has particularly promoted online Patient Access; the uptake of which has been a tremendous success.

Tattenhall Community First Responder Group is made up of volunteers who are trained and equipped by North West Ambulance Service (NWAS) to respond to certain 999 emergency calls in and around the area. As a result of our rural location, a first responder can often reach a patient in need before an ambulance is able to get there.

During lockdown we have been busier than ever responding to calls as the level of demand on NWAS and the NHS in general has increased dramatically as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Regrettably, one of the first casualties of the pandemic last March was the suspension of all our training activities.

However, as soon as we are able to do so, we will re-commence our programme of regular training for local people in basic life support and the use of a defibrillator. We will let you know when we are able start this again.

We know from direct experience that there have been many cases of Covid-19 locally over the last year, and the virus remains a very real presence in our local community and beyond.

So, stay safe, and take advantage of the vaccine as soon as it is made available to you!

Our latest read was Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens. It is set in the marshlands of coastal North Carolina, and the local fauna and flora form the focus of the story, the main part of which takes place in 1969/70. As a young girl, Kya is gradually deserted by the members of her family, and grows up alone - self-sufficient but isolated and lonely, mythologised by the town-dwellers as The Marsh Girl. The

Jottings from the crevices of his memory (Ken is an ex RAF pilot, Company director and amateur historian)

You may have flown somewhere on

holiday, but have you looked out of the window and seen, on the cloud tops below, the shadow of your aircraft in a pale halo of

ice crystals?

Did you maybe notice, a distance away, an isolated towering thunderstorm, its anvil-shaped head, and the black rain area below, in otherwise clear air? If so, did you see the lilac-coloured lightning flashes in its turbulent column? Your pilot would avoid flying into one of these because the air currents within are powerful enough to turn an aeroplane upside-down. Nice to see, but dangerous to enter.

Many years ago I saw all these things,

and much more, for I was a jet fighter

pilot who actually, and unintentionally, flew through several thunderstorms and was hit by lightening. I was in an all-

weather air force - the RAF.

Night flying in bad weather can have its interest. In some conditions I have seen a reddish-purple glow round my wing tips and tail, even sometimes lighting up the wet airstream over my cockpit canopy. Ancient mariners called this St. Elmo's fire. If it was seen playing around mast tops and rigging, they took it as a bad omen, fearing that their ship would be doomed before it reached port. I'll tell you another tale or two next time. #### **Father Lameck**

#### Let Lent transform Lives for Christ

Lent is a season of soul-searching, a time for reflection, giving and taking stock. In the earliest days of the Church lent began as a time of preparation for Easter, and by observing lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus withdrawal into the wilderness.

This has been what we have known but this year we celebrate Lent in isolation, away from the church building and unable to see our loved ones. Most of us are isolated, not because we ourselves suffer from the illness (at least vet), but in order to protect vulnerable populations from the sickness. The same crowded parishes are empty; the physical Eucharistic liturgies are currently suspended until probably just before Easter.

All this is just an assumption for no one knows but only God. Many of us who were fasting from technology now spend hours gazing at a screen, immersed in audio technologies that allow us to connect with the world outside our isolation zones.

The elderly have been cut off from the very communities that were a lifeline for them, spending hours by themselves in houses without visitors. How long will we continue to practice this social distancing? How long will our social clubs be closed? How long will our businesses be closed? How long can I pay my rent without an income? How long will my parish not offer a Communion or the sacraments for the benefit of the faithful? How long until our hospital beds are full of the sick and dying? Will I be one of them? Will it be my family or neighbour? There's a pious, albeit unhelpful temptation, to dismiss this anxiety too quickly. After all, the faithful are those without anxiety, who have no fear.

If we trust in God, then everything will be fine no matter what happens. In the end we know that we are destined for life eternal. Whatever happens in the present, whatever suffering presents itself, God will never forsake us. But in the meantime, as we wait for the easing of the lock down, may I encourage you to join me in doing just one thing 'transform lives'.

Many of our friends and relatives are patiently waiting for your extended hand of love. Whatever you can do to transform lives, be it giving your time, buying someone groceries, calling on someone you know or offering your special skills, that will be part of our theme this month of transforming lives'. Jesus did not open a soup kitchen; he fed crowds who came to hear him preach. Christianity is about more than outward behaviour. It is about the condition of the heart. We need to prepare our hearts for Easter by setting aside this time for self -examination and transforming lives for Christ. Too often we focus on what others are doing and give a blind eye on what we ourselves are doing. If there is anything that will give you joy and peace of mind, it is when we give and transform lives that have struggled for so long. God is not simply commanding outward obedience. He is commanding perfect inner obedience as well. Just as Christ made the ultimate sacrifice for us, He desires that we learn to be givers in our everyday lives in response to His generosity.

"In all things I have shown you that by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive."( Acts 20:35)

Unfortunately the Magazine ended after the first year because of lack of support

resulting in a loss of £4.00. On the inside cover of the first issue is an explanation of the purpose of the magazine. The copy has been archived by the Diocese and kept in the records. "Not surprising it didn't sell as I expect it was too expensive in the day, how forward thinking for the time. It is my intention (when allowed) to investigate further and hope we can obtain a copy. Watch this space. Stay safe everyone and look forward to when our lovely church on the hill can open its doors in all its glory Burwardsley PCC.

#### **Obituaries**



Susan Battersby- 12 May 1944 -26<sup>th</sup> November 2020
Susan was born in Coventry, Warwickshire 12 May 1944 and went to the local primary school before going onto Stoke Park Grammar School for girls until 1962, during which time she made many friends who have remained close friends for all these years. Susan is remembered by her school friends as a warm, witty and fun loving girl who excelled in sport

being the school team captain in hockey and tennis. Susan was gifted academically but was also talented, playing the violin in the school orchestra. Susan never forgot her school friends and returned each year for a reunion. Susan went to Rolle College, Exmouth in 1962 to train as a teacher and it was in 1964 that she met Derek whom she married in 1965. Once again Susan made friends at Rolle College who remained friends throughout her life. Susan's first teaching post in 1965 was at Chatsworth Street Primary School in Liverpool with a class almost 50. Susan, not being from Liverpool on her first day there could hardly understand a word the children said, but she soon acquired the ability to interpret the accent. In 1968 Susan and Derek moved back to Devon where Susan taught until the birth of Andrew in 1972 and then Simon in 1974. Susan enjoyed being at home bringing up the children. In 1982 Susan returned to teaching at Stowford Primary School, Ivybridge, and Devon and remained there until retiring in 2004. Susan became an institution at the school and inspired so many children. She was so warm, gentle and inspiring, never raising her voice in her class environment, thus it was the perfect place for the children's first experience of school. Susan was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia in December 2017. The last 12 months for Susan were extremely difficult and that lovely smile of hers was now rarely seen but she did not complain about her illness and was extremely brave. A few months ago Susan recounted "All those children I taught to read and write and now I cannot do either". Susan and Derek lived for each other and their love and respect for each other did not diminish throughout their 55 years of marriage. Friends have said we were very lucky to have known her.

## What to look out for around Tattenhall this month



During the various lockdowns in the last 12 months it has been great to see lots of people out walking in the local countryside. We are lucky here in Tattenhall to have

many readily accessible footpaths as well as the excellent Millenium Mile. The health benefits – both physical and mental – of being outdoors are now well-established and we hope that these notes may enhance your walks.

March and April are two of the best months to be outdoors as winter transitions into spring and changes to our wildlife are easily noted. Our winter bird visitors such as Fieldfare and Redwing will be leaving in March to return to their Scandinavian breeding grounds as will Pink-footed Geese -which have been such a local highlight this winter - though they return to Iceland to breed. In mid March look and listen for the first of our summer visitors the Chiffchaff (which sings its name!) to be

followed by Blackcaps and Swallows and then a succession of species until the last visitors in early May - Swifts and Spotted Flycatchers. Look out as well for the first wild flowers and the successive opening of leaves on trees. The first flowering Lesser Celandines have



already been seen but also look for Primroses, Jack-by-the-hedge, Wood Anemones, Red Campion, Cowslips, Lady's Smock and Ransomes (wild garlic - the churchyard is a great place to look for this).

Some of our butterflies over-winter as adults - Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock, Comma and Red Admiral -and can be seen on sunny days from March onwards – and sometimes even earlier. Other species overwinter as eggs, larvae or pupae and the first to emerge is the gorgeous Orange Tip which is real sign that spring is here!

#### **Dear Residents**

There have been reports of prowlers over the recent Lock Down period in the car park of a large commercial building undergoing renovation in Tattenhall. The offenders were challenged and left quickly.

It was reported that damage had been caused by anti social behaviour to the Flacca Pavilion's roof tiles /guttering / down spouts/and a bench. All are now undergoing expensive repairs

A large number of used Nitrous Oxide containers (referred to as laughing gas) have been found recently in the Millfield area and also last month along the gutter from the Youth Shelter to the Surgery car park and on the Flacca by the nets. While it's not illegal to ingest, it is illegal to sell these for that purpose. They can be highly dangerous if taken directly from the capsule especially combined with alcohol, ausing a rapid constriction of the airways, asphyxiation and possibly death if the user is not able to swiftly seek medical attention.
