

From Father Lameck An Invitation to The St Alban's Day Memorial Service June 27th at 10.30am

Remembering loss and all those who died during the Covid -19 Pandemic

But God will never forget the needy; the hope of the afflicted will never perish".

(Psalm 19:8)

The impact of the pandemic, and the national lockdown that has been in place to support the NHS and essential services during the emergency, has made it virtually impossible for relatives and friends to comfort and support their loved ones in their final hours. The social distancing measures have also resulted in restrictions for funerals and cremations. These circumstances have left so many people feeling desolate, depressed and in many cases, heartbroken. The lockdown meant that mourners were not in a position to sit by the side of loved ones on their final hour or even attend funeral due to restricted numbers.

And so St Alban's Church is inviting all those who lost their loved ones during the Covid-19 pandemic era to come and attend the memorial service. This service which is to be held on St Alban's Day is a service to offer comfort and support not only to those whose loved ones died of

Covid but all who have died during this pandemic phase or have experienced loss and grief. There will be an opportunity for families to light a candle in remembrance of their loved ones. After the service, a plaque and flowers will be laid at a dedicated tree in the churchyard in memory of our loss during this time.

This service is open to all our community and the wider area. Death has a stigma and the burden of grief can hold us captive if we let it. The service will also remember our patron, St Alban, as it is also his dedication day. May this be a process through which a loved one can be remembered and through which memories can be relived. Even though the pain of the loss may remain, may this go some way in relieving the hurt and the stigma of death and act as a public declaration that death has lost its sting. It is our hope that in this way, we will be able to walk alongside all who have been bereaved during the pandemic, and, by sharing the good news of God's love, bring some comfort and healing to all who have struggled to grieve properly during the restrictions.

St Alban's Day Who was St Alban?

The church in Tattenhall is dedicated to St Alban who is considered to be the first English Christian martyr. Until the more popular St George came along he was considered to be the patron saint of England.

Having met a Christian priest fleeing from the invading Romans (about 200AD) Alban gave him sanctuary in his home and as he got to know him, Alban was inspired to be converted to Christianity. When the Roman soldiers came to seize the priest, Alban put on his guest's cloak and presented himself to the soldiers. Despite being tortured Alban refused to

give up the hiding place of the priest and he was executed. At the place where he died an abundance of wild flowers sprung up. Later, writing about St Alban's martyrdom, William of Newbury wrote, "of all the roses of the martyrs brightly shines Saint Alban".

St Alban's Day is June 22nd and he is commemorated with a rose.

Flood Defence Work Starts at China Meadow

'Slowing the Flow' of the Mill Brook to alleviate flood risk in the centre of the village is progressing well.

Current work relates to Phase 2a of the project which is a

collaborative partnership

between Bolesworth Estate, TWiG, The Environment Agency, local farmer Robin Langford, Elm Associates and Mersey Forest.

The key objective is to hold back flood water at times of peak flow overspill from the Mill Brook upstream at China Meadow. This builds on the good practice of Phase 1 which was completed in 2016.



Already, stream-side vegetation has been removed and the location of new fencing has been staked out. The contractors have also started the preparation of drainage ditches and the installation of the earthwork bunds.

TWiG is closely monitoring the work and, when complete, they will host a couple of site visits so as to better inform those residents in Old Mill Place, in particular, of this innovative flood management initiative.

Election of Chairman

The May meeting saw Cllr Iain Keeping elected as Chairman for 2021-2022. The Council owes Cllr Keeping a debt of thanks for taking the chair again for another twelve months having already served for a number of years. Cllr Keeping has done a huge amount of work during his time as Chairman.

Jubilee Wood

The Council was disappointed to receive a report that a large amount of rubbish had been dumped in Jubilee Wood which is at the rear of the Flacca Sports Ground. The rubbish included scaffolding, barrier fencing, 7 pallets, a duvet, a tyre and large amounts of micro-plastic which were impossible to remove fully. In addition, a number of firepits had been created and damage had been done to a tree.

The Council noted the letter sent from the Bolesworth Estate which owns the land, which is managed by TWiG. It stated the amount of litter was unacceptable and warned that if rubbish continued to be dumped there, they would have no alternative but to stop public access to that area.

Community Event – Sunday 5th September 2021

The Council agreed to organise a community event which would be held on the Flacca on Sunday 5th September. The event would be a simple community get together with stalls and activities as we eased out of lockdown – more details to follow.

Welly Walk

Plans for our summer Welly Walk were coming together. The Parish Council has encouraged families, community groups, and businesses to plant up old wellies, decorate large wooden wellies and create welly displays to be included in a guide which would be sold to raise funds for a Multi-Use Games Area for Tattenhall (MUGA).

Memorial Update

Investigative works had been undertaken by a specialist company who would now produce a report identifying the cause of the sink holes that had developed in the front of the war memorial and make recommendations as to how to resolve this problem.

Virtual Meetings

It was likely that our May Parish Council meeting would be our last virtual meeting at least for the foreseeable future. Councils along with other bodies were given the power to meet virtually as part of the Covid Legislation introduced in 2020 however this expired on 7th May 2021.

It had been hoped that the Government would extend this power or even make it permanent but that has not happened. As a result, and due to ongoing Covid restrictions it was agreed to cancel our June meeting, it was hoped we would meet face to face in July for the first time since March 2020, if it was safe to do so.

Details of the July meeting will be available on the Parish Council website and on social media as soon as they have been finalised.



We are delighted to be able to confirm that preparations are now well underway to reopen the bar and clubhouse on 21 June, with the return of Friday@theFlacca on

Friday, 25 June! We look forward to welcoming everyone back, so keep an eye on our website for the latest information on plans and dates, and make sure you come along!

May and June are seeing a very welcome flurry of sporting activity at Sport & Leisure Tattenhall as all sections continue to return to normal. We are now well into this season's Cricket and AFC Tattenhall fixtures, both mid-week and weekends, and spectators are very welcome to come along again. Across other sections, club sessions and training are also in full action.

Online booking systems have been introduced for tennis, squash, racket ball, croquet and the gym, which allows members, and in the case of tennis, non-members for a fee, to be able to not only book ahead but to book remotely.

The croquet club is running taster sessions on Wednesday, 26 May, from 6 – 8pm, and Wednesday, 2 June, from 2 – 4pm. All

The Cheshire Bears have also returned to Tattenhall! The Women's American Football Team trains each Saturday morning from 10am at Sport & Leisure Tattenhall. Come along and have a look; they are always on the lookout for new members!

Obituaries

Alan George Davie (1943 - 2021)

Alan passed away on 30th January, aged 77. He lived in Tattenhall for over 40 years, the place that he raised his family and called home, having spent his childhood graving up in Waysestayshing.

his childhood growing up in Worcestershire.

Throughout his life, he had a strong love of the outdoors from hiking in North Wales, the Lake District and the Alps, to more recent years pottering in the garden amongst the flowers and wildlife. His house had many guidebooks of walks he had done, or planned to do, printouts he used to pour over while

planning his walks. He had been an active member of several local walking groups and enjoyed many walks and social events across Cheshire. His career in Pharmaceuticals was recalled fondly by Alan, he formed some lifelong friendships and it also allowed him to travel which he loved. Alan keenly followed the business news for Pfizer in particular after he retired and maintained a strong interest in sciences, having started his first job as a research chemist for ICI. He liked to think that it would be hard to pull the wool over his eyes, and his enquiring mind usually proved him right. A traditional family man, Alan was a loving and proud father to his two children, and granddad to 5 grandchildren. He will be forever missed by his children, their families, and his friends. Rest peacefully.

Revd Arthur Hargreaves 87 years

Born in Lancashire, Arthur, qualified at Manchester University in , where he also met his future wife of 40 years, Jill. Following surgical positions at Withington Hospital and Manchester Royal Infirmary, he became a Consultant General Surgeon at Salford Royal & Hope Hospitals in 1968, where he stayed for the remainder of his career. Arthur was an examiner at the Royal College of Surgeons in England, Edinburgh and Glasgow during the Eighties and Nineties. He was President of the Manchester Regional Association of Surgeons in 1984-85, following a period of years as Secretary. He was also a Council Member of the Association of Surgeons of GB & Ireland from 1989-1992. Elected to the Moynihan Chirurgical Club in 1974, he served as President in 1996. Jill Hargreaves (Consultant Anaesthetist) predeceased him in 2001, and he leaves his three children and four grandchildren.

Joyce Raine 95 years

Only five months after the death of her husband Jack we are sad to share the news that Joyce Raine passed away on 17 April. Joyce lived to 95 and for most of her life despite underlying heath conditions was well and active and a much loved member of the church and village community. Joyce and Jack moved to Tattenhall in 2008 and were delighted to tell everyone it was the best move they ever made! Joyce attended the WI meetings which she really enjoyed and was a regular worshipper at St Albans. She was a regular helper at coffee mornings, church fetes and anywhere else she was needed.

She had many friends in the village and her kindness and warm smile will be missed by many. Joyce had one daughter Pamela and she lived next door to Pam and her family for the last few years of her life. Family was very important to Joyce and as her health weakened they were there to support and help each other. Joyce had one grandchild of whom she was so proud and who was a frequent visitor through these last five months since the death of her husband. Nature Notes for June

After a cold and late Spring we all need some 'flaming June' weather! Let's hope for some seasonal warmth at least. All the migrant birds should have arrived before the

migrant birds should have arrived before the

end of May with the last ones being Swifts and Spotted Flycatchers. At the time of writing (mid May) the first Swifts have arrived and the flycatchers are eagerly awaited. Swifts are much bigger than Swallows and House Martins and have a sickle shaped wing.

They are true masters of the skies spending their whole lives in the air apart from nesting in buildings – they sleep on the wing

and even mate while flying.

Other species to look out for are the first dragon and damselflies. If you have a garden pond you may already have seen Large Red Damselfly and maybe one of the blue damsels such as Blue-tailed. Broadbodied and Four-spotted Chasers may also have appeared: the former loving newly dug ponds. If you travel slightly further afield to

the River Dee at Aldford you should see numerous Banded Demoiselles and possibly a very rare Club-tailed Dragonfly: the Dee is a stronghold for both species.

Work has started on Phase 2 of the flood alleviation scheme on the Mill Brook. As part of the project a detailed

survey for water voles has been completed. We knew that some were present in the stretch behind the Flacca but it was great to find signs much further upstream. Water Vole has declined by over 90% in the last 50 years mainly because of predation by escaped American Mink so it's really pleasing to find them surviving locally.
