The July meeting of the Parish Council took place in the car park of the Bear & Ragged Staff on Monday 26th July. The meeting commenced with the co-option of a new Councillor, Mr Stephen Hornby, who signed the acceptance of office paperwork and officially joined the meeting.

The Parish Council was sorry to learn that the long-time coordinator of our HomeWatch scheme, Graham Marsden was stepping down. The Chairman, Councillor Keeping, thanked Graham for his hard work and presented a small token of appreciation.

Tenders had been received for the Spinney Project and a A Planning Application had been submitted by the Parish Council to enable the thinning of trees to allow the project to proceed.

Plans for a community orchard on land to the rear of Gorsefield were also discussed. The land is currently owned by CWaC, who mow it several times a year.

A group of Councillors would form a working group and proposals include plans to plant apple trees in the Autumn, with CWaC providing the trees, stakes and ties. The Parish Council would probably be expected to undertake future pruning and maintenance of the trees.

Any resident who would like to be included in the working group should contact the Parish Clerk, details above.

MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) Two potential sites were currently being investigated.

Tattenhall Together Again will take place on Sunday 5th September on the Flacca from 2pm to 4pm. A Parade from the Barbour Institute to the Flacca will leave at 1.30pm led by Crewe Brass Band, with children carrying wands they have made. The High Street and Burwardsley Road would be closed for the half hour of the procession.

The Parish Council thanked Councillor Mike Jones who provided the funds from his member's' budget for the brass band and costs of the road closure.

Many local community and business groups had requested stalls; the Ice Cream Farm will provide ice creams; donkey rides will be available, and there will be games, displays and sports to try.

Ken's Korner

Jottings from the crevices of his memory

Five months after joining the RAF, with multiple tests passed, I was in an open-cockpit pre-war biplane, flying upside down in a snowstorm over Lincolnshire. My instructor was testing me to make sure I didn't panic, wasn't airsick, or incapably scared. No ground tests could do that; it had to be the real thing.

Three days after my 19th birthday, after 7hr. 45min. intense instruction, I flew my first solo in a Chipmunk. I had been taught emergency procedures and how to recover from a spin. That's when a plane spirals earthward out of control. The ground appears to be rotating wildly round, you are disoriented, you have to recover from it – or probably die.

Next, I flew lumbering twin-engined Oxfords, was awarded my coveted 'Wings', and became a Pilot Officer. I 'signed on' to stay in the RAF.

Jet aircraft were easier to fly. First, I flew with an instructor in two-seat Meteors then soloed, after much study, in single-seat Vampires. You had to get it right first time. There was nobody with you to ask or take over. My final course taught me combat techniques and to fire cannon and rockets. I could see cannon shells hit the ground (and, hopefully,) the target. Rockets streaked away from the plane, and then you caught them up just as they hit – uncanny, that! Squadron service came next. I'd made it!



THE ROLE OF A TOWER CAPTAIN

A tower captain is responsible to the Rector for the organisation of the ringing and maintenance of the bells. This includes the running of practices, teaching new ringers, encouraging

progress and ensuring there are enough ringers for Sunday service and weddings. With the steeple keeper he/she is responsible for maintaining the running gear in good order and the repair/replacement of worn/broken parts such as ropes/stays (the safety device to prevent damage to bearings if a bell is rung too hard) Communication is essential to keep everyone up to date with local and national events, made so much easier with modern electronic means.

We are in union with the Chester Diocesan Guild and pay subs to them and it is the tower captain who ensures these are paid (or treasurer if a separate position in larger towers) and for proposing new members to the Guild.

Any of these roles can be delegated if necessary, but as they say, the buck stops with the tower captain.

What's Happening by the War Memorial?

Residents may have noticed the quite significant earthworks that are currently taking place at The Cascade, adjacent to Tattenhall War Memorial. Long-term maintenance to the outflow under the High Street and at The Cascade (where the water leaves the Mill Pond) is in progress. Whilst not directly related to the flood event earlier this year, maintaining both the dam and the top of the bund all contribute toward the excellent work already undertaken by the Environment Agency, TWiG and other partners, regarding Phase 1 and Phase 2A of flood mitigation in the district.

Once completed, and re-seeded, the wild meadows will return and

look as glorious as most recently.

This old cast iron wheel was hauled out of the stream. A smithy is marked on an old map of this area, and the question is whether it came from there?
