Remembering Rightly

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month marks the signing of the Armistice, on 11th November 1918. It signalled the end of World War, however on Remembrance Sunday on Sunday the 14th November we will remember all those who have died in conflicts throughout The World. This year, due to repairs being done at the village war memorial in Tattenhall, the Remembrance Service is going to be held at St Alban's Church on Sunday 14th November starting at 10am. Refreshments will be served after the service.

Every year as we observe this service, most of us will either have a poppy on our jackets, cars or homes. But what do you do with your poppy after Remembrance Day? Do you throw it away? Or keep it for next year? Does it languish in a drawer until you come across it in a few months time? Perhaps you have a very particular place for it? This is why this year I am asking this question. "What will you, what will I, do with our remembering after Remembrance Day?

Today there are many acts of remembrance but on 11th of November, there will be countrywide remembrance of all those who died in the two great wars and beyond.

The question before us is what we do with our poppy after remembering each year. When do we get it out again and brush it off? For some of us that is not what will happen because remembering is more personal, because with it is mourning what has happened to a colleague, a friend, a partner, a relative, a parent, a child. That is not something you can switch in and out of in line with the calendar. But for many of us we are at more of a distance sharing in solidarity in that remembering — and

while it is not as personal for us, it matters.

How we remember and what we do with our remembering, matters.

What we do on Remembrance Sunday, matters because if we just put our remembering, along with our poppies to one side, then we have not remembered rightly. Remembering is about more than setting aside a day in a year to remind ourselves of the facts.

Remembering rightly is about how we live in the light of those facts especially as a community and as a nation.

In the Old Testament the people of God, the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember. They had to remember who they were, where they had come from and how things in their life were going wrong. But that call to remember was not about just reminding them how they had got into their current mess, it was also a call, more than that, a promise to a future that would be different.

For right remembering, honourable remembering we must have a vision for the future. God's ultimate promise for us is that God will dwell with us, there will be no more mourning, no more crying, no more pain, no more war and we will get out of our cycles of violence and war because all of that has been gathering up in Christ who has shown us a different way.

And that future starts with us, now, because there is no going back, only moving forward.

The October meeting of the Parish council took place at the Barbour Institute on Monday the 4th October.

The Chairman began the meeting by asking those present to observe a minute's silence to remember Cllr Georgina Blackhurst who sadly had passed away. She had been an enthusiastic committed member of the parish council for a number of years and had led the community safety group. She had been very involved with the local community and would be sadly missed.

- Public participation raised the problem of vehicles speeding on Burwardsley road and the refusal of drivers to give way to oncoming traffic. It was agreed that this matter would be raised with the PCSO to monitor. The parish council was also planning to undertake speed awareness training to allow the use of the speed indicator device and speed gun in the village.
- Concern again was raised of the standard of parking around the Tattenhall Road and Chester Road junction, and this would also this be raised with the PCSO.
- Plans for the creation of the community orchard on the land off Gorsefield were being developed. CW&C will be supplying a mix of 40 traditional fruit tree species. Once a date has been arranged with officers for planting this

- would be advertised and volunteers' assistance requested. The area would be mown once or twice a year and the Parish Council would be looking for volunteers to assist with pruning.
- The War Memorial issue had been discussed in a meeting on 27th September, the actions from which were already in progress. It was noted that longevity of the proposed solution must be taken into account as the PC would not want to face the same problems again.
- It was noted that repairs to the War Memorial would be very costly and that the Parish Council would have to seek grants to cover this.
- The Spinney project works were proceeding well and a number of favourable comments had been made on how much improved the site now was. Discussions were taking place with CW&C regarding the reinstatement of the pond on the grassed triangle next to the Spinney. Additional funding received had also allowed the implementation of an extra foot way and wildflower seeding to take place in this area.
- The next Parish council meeting would be on 1st November 2021 in the Barbour Institute at 7.30pm. All residents are welcome to attend.

What is Alpha?



In a restoration in 1854 by James Harrison all the masonry was removed except for the west tower which had been built in 1512. During the restoration a Norman doorway on the

A chancel and vestry were added in 1891. If you are new to the area, please note that you are most welcome to come and worship at this church. We are blessed to have such a historic and community institution which is open to all people. We are very fortunate and blessed to have a few parishioners who look after this building.

If you are fed up, lonely, bored, anxious, worried about stuff or itching to do something, volunteering in my book helps enormously. I have believed this ever since my early 20s (when having a broken heart or two thinking Mr Wrong was Mr Right) I realised when I was driving home after a couple of hours with my Brownies that I had ceased to hurt for at least 120 glorious minutes. So involved was I with the task in hand I had no other thought.

I am not suggesting any one who volunteers has to be in the depths – I just needed a link! Of course volunteering isn't everyone's cup of tea but don't you think it is worth considering?

During the last few months St Alban's has benefitted from several people offering to help. This has meant that the mammoth task of mowing the huge churchyard is now almost controllable (just a few more sections to

Based on the principle "many hands make light work", Patricia Morris has devised a grid system for the Church interior where one or two people take responsibility for the tidying and cleaning of a particular section. KEN'S KORNER

Jottings from the crevices of his memory

You've heard of 'old retainers'? These, in my experience, were elderly men in poor circumstances who had found lodgings and jobs in the countryside.

One I remember was old Harry Husselbury

who lived in a derelict car inside a cart shed; part of the smithy by my grandma's inn. He, a skilled wheelwright, helped in the forge. Grandma gave him his dinner on a chipped enamel plate which she left out for him to collect.

In winter he preferred to sleep sitting against the warm bricks of the forge. He seemed content with his lot, but could be a bit cantankerous.

Harry took ill during the war and went to hospital. As was policy to keep beds free

for war casualties, he was moved away to Arclid workhouse where he died and was buried, three to each unmarked paupers grave, at the north side of a nearby churchyard.

The other, Ned Potter, lived in a wooden bunkhouse at the back of the inn. He had a bunk bed, a stove, and a stick or two of furniture. He cleaned the outhouses and stables, and did odd jobs for my grandma. He was self-sufficient and content. When cracks appeared in the walls of his home he pasted

newspaper cuttings over them to keep out drafts. The paper was inches thick in some places! When he died he was given a decent burial and his hut became derelict.

He was before my time.
