



A Christmas Message From Father Lameck


"Christmas Presence" The Light

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light, Isaiah promises. The Gospel story has light in it. "The glory of the Lord shone around them," he writes, and we can only picture glory through light.

This is the true meaning of Christmas-

"Do not be afraid, for see I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people, to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour who is the Messiah, the Lord."

Christmas arrives again with all the promise of remembrance



work. When Isaiah told of the coming Prince of Peace, he spoke of light dispelling darkness. The metaphor of light is central to our celebration of Christmas. After all, even as John introduces his gospel by identifying Jesus as the Word who became flesh, John also describes Jesus as "the True Light which, coming into the world, enlightens every man." With all the darkness in our world today caused by evil, war, corruption and hatred there is need for us to invite this light of Christ. Whatever your Christmas is like, Jesus understands it and will fill it with His presence. Whatever your Christmas is like, Jesus understands it and will fill it with His presence. NOSTALGIA'S NOT WHAT IT WAS!

Or if you are a Max Bygraves fan (now there's a blast from the past) "Fings ain't what they used to be"!

I wonder who is familiar with the term Mid Life Crisis? Some time ago it was said that people of a certain age experienced this. If there was such a thing does it still exist? With so much attention focused on Health and Well-being nowadays I doubt it; and when is mid life anyway? In my day reaching 40 was significant and one became the target for tasteless jokes, gifts which included all sorts of aids and the obligatory zimmer frame. Looking back we were all very cruel to our aged friends but it was great fun! Apart from the fact 40 is so young to do such deeds, it doesn't seem so funny now that the possibility of needing all these things gets ever closer.

ever closer. I decided I was having my mid life crisis although I wouldn't describe it as a crisis, more an awakening - in my early 40's. Driving the children to school I remember pointing out the daffodils on the roadside. They looked so beautiful and strikingly more yellow. I continued with this new take on nature noticing the trees and buds like never before. Everything seemed so vivid and I promise you I hadn't been to SpecSavers! I started to think how huge Wagon Wheels used to be and what a lot of Mars Bar there was for six old pence and how it would last half the way home as a snack after school. I used to walk over a mile and a half each way to my Senior School. As you know there is much to remember about our youth. Everyone will remember different things but if we put every memory every person had in a box I bet they would all resonate with us. For me days were longer, the summers warmer, there were long school holidays when we built dens, walks and runs with the dog through the incredible woods just over the lane from my housewith never a care or ever feeling scared. I remember a huge box in the corner of the living room with a tiny screen which televised the likes of Muffin the Mule, Watch with Mother (can you remember the five programmes?) the radio equivalent "Listen with Mother - Are you sitting comfortably? Then I'll begin!" Pastry, Sooty & Sweep (always watched from behind the settee - Sooty petrified me as did clowns when I was five); Emergency Ward 10 and something called Quatermass? I was too

young to be allowed to watch it but my sister 5 years my senior was scared stiff by it. So many things one can recall just by thinking. However when I am in nostalgic mode I do more than think - I have this ability to be practically transported back to situations, not in a Dr Who, Time Lord way but I can truly, really feel it, sense it, smell it. For instance I can recall exactly how Tattenhall was when we first came upon it over 40 years ago. I can feel the sense of a sleepy village where although one didn't properly know everybody there were few enough people that everyone was familiar and everyone said hello. There were no cars to speak of in the High Street and Mr Smith travelled by horse and cart. I can remember when the Beehive was a store and baked bread and I can feel how it was on a sunny afternoon when we stopped there for an ice cream. We had been looking round the area to find a suitable place to live when my husband took up his new job. I fell in love with the village that day and knew it was the place I wanted to be. Things have changed a lot but not everything! The amazing Tattenhall Community Spirit is still very much in evidence. The Lockdown demonstrated its strength and I could list a host of examples but one very recent incident I must recall because it showed me the willingness of people to help and take the time to care. I

was retracing my footsteps looking for my earring which I had lost somewhere on route. At a particular moment I had stopped at the kerb to cross the road to go up Church Bank but I was still looking. A car stopped and the driver who was known to me made a suitable comment. I told him my problem and rather than drive off with some platitude he parked up, got out and started searching with me! I thought that was so kind. Then something even more extraordinary. I was in Church Bank by this time and a young woman stopped me and asked if I was allright. Relaying the story once more she too joined in the search. I have no idea who she was, still don't, but I was enormously touched by the gesture and what is more my husband thinks he saw her several days later and was sure she was still looking! Just a crumb from a huge delicious cake but it makes my heart sina.

Tattenhall emotionally and physically is the place for me!

Lent Course 2023 Stations of the Cross

Dates- 22nd February23 – 29th March 2023 Venue- St Alban's Community Room Time 6pm-7 pm

The 'Stations of the Cross', also known as 'The Way of The Cross', is a devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ's last day on Earth as a man. The Stations of the Cross are most commonly prayed during Lent on Wednesdays and Fridays, and especially on Good Friday – the day of the year upon which the events actually occurred.

The Stations of the Cross are commonly found in churches as a series of 14 small icons, or images. Taken together, the stations are used as a mini pilgrimage, particularly during Lent, and it reflects the journey of pilgrims following Jesus' actual footsteps in the Holy Land. The Stations help us to 'spiritually connect' with the suffering and death of Jesus; after all, he went through all that pain and suffering to save *us.* During Lent, we will be looking at the Stations of the Cross and reflect on each one of them.

The 14 Stations are as follows:

1.	Jesus is condemned to death	8.	Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem
2.	Jesus accepts the cross	9.	Jesus falls the third time
3.	Jesus fall the first time	10.	Jesus is stripped of His garments
4.	Jesus meets His Mother	11.	Crucifixion: Jesus is nailed to the cross
5.	Simon of Cyrene carries the cross	12.	Jesus dies on the cross
6.	Veronica wipes the face of Jesus	13.	Jesus' body is removed from the cross
7.	Jesus falls the second time	14.	Jesus is placed in the tomb

Jean was born in York in 1940. She was the elder daughter and had one sister, Christine, whom she remained very close to until she sadly passed away on 25th August. Jean spent the first 73 years of her life living in and around York, and was always deeply fond of her Yorkshire roots. She started work at the Yorkshire General Life Insurance company and it was there she met many friends, colleagues and eventually her husband of 49 years, Tony. Sport always paid a huge part in Jean's life – not only was Tony a keen and very capable footballer in the York area, Jean too played hockey at a high level in the York league. Her main hockey team was York Olympics who were very competitive with another local team. It was in 2013 that Jean, with Tony at the time made what was a very big decision to move from York to Chester to be closer to Chris, Alison and the boys. That decision became even bigger and ten times tougher when Tony passed away, unexpectedly, literally as the house sales were going through.

However, it's been 9 years now since that move was completed, and Jean left her beloved Yorkshire to make a new home here in Tattenhall. Jean became a keen follower of Chester FC and also Liverpool as she followed closely both Ben and George in their footballing careers. In the final two years of her life, Jean moved into Gifford Lea, and became an integral part of the St Alban's community where she sang in the choir.

The Parish Council held its monthly meeting on 7th November in the Barbour Institute.

Councillors and members of the public were pleased to welcome back PCSO John Hurst who was catching up on all that had happened in his absence. He stressed that incidents must be reported to the police if residents want any action to be taken and noted some comments made to him.

David Bish of the Royal British Legion thanked the Parish Council for their work in getting the War Memorial repaird, and in time for the Remembrance Service.

Agenda Items of Note

The Community Land Trust reported that their project was on hold until early 2023 because a developer and Responsible Provider had yet to be found to build and administer the properties. The group hoped to attract new members but it was pointed out that little information was given to existing members so newer residents could not be expected to know about CLT.

Planning matters:

The Chester Road developers had requested a variation to their planning approval to reduce the number of affordable properties on the site. The Parish Council agreed to strongly object to this proposal.

Highways Issues:

Only 7 volunteers had come forward to be trained for Speedwatch in the village and only 2 had replied to a recent email. It was felt that the project should be community led so it would be up to individuals to get involved. Further information can be obtained from the Clerk.

There had been very little change in the speed of traffic since the introduction of the new limits. It was felt that a different approach was needed to address the issue

of speed and that the Parish Council should work with Highways to find alternatives.

There had been a suggestion that the limit on the road from Higher Huxley cottages to Parsley Woods should be reduced to 30mph.

War Memorial:

Repairs had been done and the gravel replaced so the War Memorial would be ready for Remembrance Sunday on 13th November.

Christmas in Tattenhall:

New lights would be installed on the roof lines in the village and would include the Barbour Institute;

Wires would be strung over the High Street to enable hanging stars to be installed;

Christmas Parties were organised; the Christmas Light Switch On would be on 2nd December on the Millfield; the Snowman Trail would start on 2nd December with prizes from the Spar and a letter box would be placed outside the shop for Letters to Father Christmas.

Further details can be found in the magazine and on posters around the village.

Tarporley Round Table will be in Tattenhall on Friday 16th December with their float, from approximately 5-8.00pm.

If you have any issues to raise with the Parish Council, the Clerk and Councillors can be found at the Village Market at the Flacca on 4th December and 9th January 2023.

Parish Council elections will be held in May 2023. Anyone interested in standing should contact the Clerk for details. Please do consider joining the Parish Council as new Councillors are always welcome.

As we placed wreaths on the Tattenhall War Memorial this year, Ken remembered his days of National Service that led to him joining the RAF

Ken's Korner Jottings from the crevices of his memory



The dreaded brown OHMS envelope dropped through our letterbox It contained a letter and a Travel Warrant. I was told where to report, when, and what to take with me, for my National Service.

On Tuesday, November 13th, 1951, I left home, small suitcase in hand. At Central Station, Liverpool, I exchanged my Travel warrant for a ticket to Padgate. A trickle of scared 18-year-olds walked to the gates of the RAF camp. 'Welcome to The Royal Air Force' read the notice.

Given directions, I found my way to a hut to join 12 other aircrew hopefuls. Latrines were outside, were spotless, and only partly roofed. Issued with our 'irons', knife fork, spoon and mug, we were marched (shambled) to the mess. I, like most others, couldn't eat much lunch. Marched to the Bedding Store, issued with blankets,

sheets, and a pillow (of sorts), we returned to our hut and were shown how to make our beds. We went to the Coal Store, filled buckets, and brought back our fuel ration for the stove in the centre of our hut. Our cases went under our beds.

Teatime came, we ate a bit more, and were free for the evening. Lights-out was 22.00 hours. Reveille, 07.00 hours; both heralded by a bugle over the camp tannoy. Fellow recruits were in tears, some wrote home or to girlfriends. I went to the camp Astra cinema.

During ensuing days we were issued with uniforms, sent our civvies home, were attested, had various medicals, and filled in many forms.

I had joined the RAF.
