Greetings from the Rector

As we move deeper into the Trinity season, that long, green stretch of the Church year, I am reminded of the quiet beauty found in the ordinary.

Trinity season sometimes referred to as "Ordinary Time," is anything but ordinary when seen through the eyes of faith. It is in this time that the Church invites us to grow not in haste, but in depth. Like the steady unfolding of summer into autumn, the soul is nurtured not by sudden revelation, but by daily faithfulness. "But the eyes of the Lord are on those who fear him, on those whose hope is in his unfailing love." (*Psalm 33:18*)

The doctrine of the Trinity Father, Son, and Holy Spirit can seem abstract, even daunting. But I often say that the Trinity is not a puzzle to be solved, but a relationship to be entered. We are invited into the eternal communion of love that exists within God Himself. All we need to do is allow it to transform us because His love begins to shape our lives.

This season teaches us to live out our faith in the mundane moments. How do we respond to conflict? How do we extend hospitality? Are we open to being guided by the Holy Spirit in small, everyday ways? Trinity season is about putting theology into practice by praying more thoughtfully, loving more sacrificially, and serving more joyfully.

May we ask God to allow us to see the fruits of this season in small but powerful ways. Let us see a widow who begins mentoring young mothers, a young person caring for the old, a couple opting to care for the vulnerable and a group of volunteers opting to visit the sick. None of these acts make headlines, but they shine with the light of divine love. So let us not rush through this season. Let us instead dwell in it patiently, gratefully, and expectantly. God is not only present in the high feast days or dramatic conversions, but also in the steady rhythm of worship, work, and witness. That is the gift of Trinity season: the invitation to abide in the mystery and live the gospel in every way possible for the Lord.



JANE'S JOTTINGS

A few weeks ago, I had a chat with a very nice lady who had recently been diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease. She was very easy to talk to and we soon found we had more than Parkinson's in **common**. It turns out she feels exactly as I do about packing suitcases. A simple task you may think, but not for us. On the contrary the mere mention of it pushes up the stress levels. Why this should be I do not know. It should be an exciting and happy job as most packs are prior to a holiday or a visit to friends and family. For me it's a mountain to climb! I think it stems from having two babies within 20 months of each other because I can remember feeling exhausted and the extra task of collecting everything one could possibly need for me and the children was sort of overwhelming. I always worried about forgetting something and usually over compensated. I still take too much! Or it maybe I haven't forgotten my Guide motto -"Be Prepared"! The male of the species, in my opinion. does not recognise or understand how a woman packs. A woman takes seasonal gear plus cold weather stuff just in case. A variety of trousers, skirts and dresses because she never knows from day to day what sort of mood she will be in never mind the weight factor! Then there is the question of what shoes will go best with the chosen outfits and there is always more than one. One's own toiletries and cosmetics are essential because they don't exist in other counties or countries!! We have a system. I'm responsible for the washing and collation of all things and my

husband puts them in the case. Lucky me! He's very good at it and certainly gets a pint into to a half pint pot. When we get to nest in our temporary home I always unpack. I like putting things in order and finding suitable places especially if there is a shortage of space. We had an unusual room in Japan once. It reminded me of caravan interiors of a bygone age. I half expected the bed to retract into the wall at any moment. We had a lot of luggage and there were only 4 hangers on a hook, not a single drawer or wardrobe to be had. That was challenging!

Unpacking I don't mind. As I said my husband puts in and I take out. It has been that way for years and then suddenly out of nowhere he became an "expert" on unpacking as he watched me unpack. He started telling me what to do and where to put things. I was so infuriated I stormed out of the door and marched off. After a few purposeful steps I realised we were on a cruise ship and I had no place to go! I am determined to beat this loathing of packing. I will start with advice from the Little Book of Calm' and allow plenty of time to get everything together. This should help my stress levels. Then when the inevitable last minute emergency arises it can be dealt with sensibly and not at the same time I am arguing with a case that is too small!

I will let you know if it works!

She met future husband Jeffrey at a Young Farmers dance at the Barbour Institute and they married in the snow at St Helen's Tarpoley, in February 1957, settling down at Yew Tree Farm.

Jean was the typical farmer's wife, helping out on the farm whilst bringing up a family of five children. After graduation (BSc Math) he worked in Research at Dounreay and later at The Electricity Research Centre (Capenhurst) as a Mathematician and eventually S.M./Head of Research. Katharine, Hannah and Tamsin and latterly 4 grand-children.

Geoffrey had many hobbies including caring for injured animals/birds - as a boy and later Welsh Black cattle, chickens, ducks, then Blue and Gold Macaws, parrots, Tropical Marine fish and several Bee Hives. He enjoyed orchid cultivation. In Scotland Geoffrey took part in Mountain Rescue and enjoyed hunting, shooting and fishing.

Moving to Tattenhall towards retirement he joined Probus Club, Tattenhall Runners and

The Parish Council held two meetings, one in lae July and one in early August, at which the public was invited to give its views on two lage developments proposed for Tattenhall village.

At the July meeting, Taylor Wimpey gave a short presentation on their plans for a Chester Road site for 110 houses. These be the usual mix of 5,4, and 3 bed properties with 30% affordable homes on the site. At that time this was an outline application and the developers were conducting a public consultation. The Parish Council's response to this Outline application was to strongly object. The full comments are available one the website. A full application was received in August and the Parish Council will discuss this and formulate comments at its regular monthly meeting on 1st September. The other application, by Gladman Homes for 100 houses along Tattenahll Road, was a full application so an Extraordinary Parish Council meeting was convened when the public was invited to comment and the Parish Council then decided on their response. These comments are available on the Parish Council website and on Tattenhall Online, and made strong objection to the application.

At the meeting, Cllr. Iain Keeping brought Councillors up to date with the review of the Neighbourhood Plan. Since the review began,

significant changes have been made to the National Planning Policy Framework and these will have a major impact on Cheshire West and Chester and also on key service centres such as Tattenhall. In order to try and mitigate this impact, it is now proposed that Policy One of the NP is amended and that sites for development are allocated. To this end, the Parish Council is working with planning consultants, ONH, who have been instructed to carry out a Settlement Spatial Plan, identifying sites for allocation. There is some urgency to this work and it is hoped it can be delivered within a 6 week period.

Please go to the Parish Council website to read the minutes of the meeting for a full report.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Monday 1st September at 7.30pm in the Barbour Institute.

Before the formal meeting, the Parish Council will be holding a drop-in Flooding meeting when Councillors would like to hear of residents' experiences of flooding, either in their own home or garden, business premises or on highways. This will be from 6—7.30pm also in the Barbour Institute.








What is a Repair Café? – A Repair Café is a place where you can bring broken or defective household appliances, machines, clothing, ornaments, pictures or tools

for fixing by volunteers. A bit like the Repair Shop on TV but without the tears.





Do you sharpen tools? Yes, we can sharpen kitchen knives, garden shears, secateurs, loppers. But not chainsaws.

Is it new? We have been running this in Tattenhall since July 2022 and have fixed 299 items

Is it safe? We PAT test all electrical goods before any electrical repair and afterwards

Is it free? There is no fee, it is free. We gratefully receive any donations as there are costs we have to cover like room hire. We are all volunteers though.

Is it guaranteed? There is no guarantee, we try our best. At the moment our success rate is 70%

Why? To save you the cost of having to replace something. To save sending stuff to landfill. To save the CO_2 involved in having a new replacement thing. We reckon we have saved Tattenhall over £14,000 in replacement costs, and over 7000kg of CO_2
