FROM THE RECTOR

The Day and Hour Unknown (Mark 13:32

I was reading a magazine interview where a paramedic was explaining about his experience in saving lives. When the reporter asked him what he had learned about death through his work, he said; "I have learned two things: how fragile the lives of human beings are; and how hard it is for us to believe it.

When will death come to us? In the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or when we are asleep? It will come. Just do not believe it will not come. In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus is talking to his disciples about the future. Many of us would like to know what the future holds for us and this is why fortune tellers do such a good trade, and why people want to know when the end of the world will happen, even though countless people before them have thought they knew and were wrong.

In Jesus' day people were waiting for God to come, waiting for the Messiah, the Christ, the anointed king whom God would use to kick the pagan Romans out of Palestine and give the Jews their own land back and give justice to the poor and downtrodden so that they got the life which they deserved. When is God coming to make judgement on bad people, the faithless people, the foreign people, they asked? And the disciples asked the same thing, because they saw God at work in Jesus, and assumed that what they expected about God coming to sort the world out was going to happen soon. In chapter 13 of Mark's Gospel Jesus addresses this expectation. He talks about the forthcoming destruction of the wonderful New Jerusalem temple built by Herod, about the persecution of his followers, and about a time of dreadful suffering, which will happen in the lifetime of his disciples, but with yet further sufferings ahead. It is a bit like when you are trekking in the mountains and you see in front of you a range of hills which you

have to climb, and behind them you can just see the tops of an even higher range which seem quite close, until you get to the top of the first set of hills and see the distance that lies between.

Many of us long for justice; but we also have to fear what justice and judgement may mean for us. Isaiah and other prophets in Israel were very aware that, if we ask for God's judgement on the injustices and cruelties and sins of others, then we must be ready to face God's judgement on our own injustices and sins as well. And that judgement, says Jesus, is not just in the future. It starts here and now.

Our conduct has consequences, and we have to live with them, whether it is the hard reality of Brexit, or the degradation of the environment, or the hurt we cause to others. In these days of Twitter and trolling, people are quick to condemn and write words of hatred and judgement upon others. But to those of us who do, I urge you to stop and look at yourself, before other people do it for you. Jesus does not tell us about the future because we have to live in the present moment, which alone is where God is to be found. We do not find God in our regrets or our fantasies, but only here and now.

In Mark chapter 13, Jesus does not speculate or judge others, but turns the question back to us:

Have you been reconciled to God while there is time?

Have you found God's forgiveness and shared it with others?

Are you awake and living with God in Jesus Christ, whenever death comes to you, or are you sleeping in false security?

How fragile the lives of human beings are; how hard it is for us to believe it. When will judgement come to us? Is it in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, during the day or when we are asleep? Keep awake. For come it will.

Autumn Bible Study

Many thanks for all those who managed to come to our June and July Summer Bible study series on 'Forgiveness and Reconciliation'. Our next bible study is going to be on Wednesday the 17th October in the Vault. We will be looking at "Searching Stories' from the Gospel of Luke which takes us to the heart of the Gospel.

17th October: Introductory Session

This session will consider the significance of stories in the life and faith and in the Gospel of Luke; and will explore how our human stories are interpreted and challenged in the light of Christ's story.

24th October: Session One- "Road to Emmaus"

In this session, we will enter into the Emmaus story (Luke 24:13-35) and will consider how the Risen Christ encounters us on our Journeys and in our stories, in the guise of a stranger and in the ordinariness of life.

31st October: Session Two- "The Good Samaritan"

We will enter into Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) and his encounter with the lawyer; and will allow the story to challenge and test the boundaries of our understanding of God's grace.

7th November: Session Three- "The Prodigal Son"

We will enter into Jesus' parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32) and will explore the ways in which God's love is offered and responded to in different relationships within the parable, and within our own lives.

14th November: Session Four- "The Widow and the Judge"

In this session, we will explore Jesus' parable of the Widow and the Judge (Luke 18:1-8); and will consider the ways in which persistence is a necessary element of faith.

21st November: Session Five – "Zacchaeus"

This session explores the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10) and the ways in which we are met in the present by the living Christ.

Items brought up and briefly discussed included the new bus shelter on Tattenhall Road, flash flooding, and how this was going to be overcome in the future, use of the community room and the lack of public open space.

The recent Scooter rally was discussed, as was the success of Carfest, and the good news that it will be returning to Bolesworth next year.

Agenda items included:

Planning

The planning application for the Bear & Ragged Staff was discussed, as was the planning application for Portico House.

Maintenance

Concerns over overhanging trees in the Spinney were discussed. The Parish Council had recently had all of its trees inspected and work was carried out on the recommendation of the professional company which was engaged.

It was agreed that the hedge in front of the youth shelter be cut to a lower level. The Clerk would arrange this.

Various maintenance issues around the allotments at Gatesheath were discussed.

It was also agreed that several members of the Parish Council should be trained in playground inspection, to complement the annual inspection.

New parking restrictions on Chester Road were considered. The Parish Council asked for a change to the positioning of the double yellow lines which create a passing place. The request would be sent to CWaC and provided it was agreed the new parking restrictions would be implemented by CWaC in the near future.

The Chairman thanked all for attending, and advised that the next monthly meeting would be on 3rd September, all welcome.


