A New Year Message

2019 is over, 2020 is here.

As we stand here at the beginning of a New Year, it is a good time to reflect on the year that is ending and look forward into the year that is soon to begin. It is also a good time for God's people to take inventory of their walk with the Lord.

We should take a very close look at where we are in our relationship with Him. We need to examine ourselves and see where we have been, where we are and where the Lord wants us to be. This passage gives us the opportunity and the challenge to do just that. We may have had some challenges in the past year, but we cannot continue to focus on that. We need to look ahead for a brighter tomorrow.

We had our elections just before Christmas and whatever those results mean to you, life has to continue. You might have had your fair share of issues in the past year, but you cannot continue to be stuck on the crossroads of confusion. That period is now in the

past and we have to focus to what lies ahead. Paul challenges us to set our minds on things that are above where Christ is, not on things that are below. In our spiritual lives, the same thing is true. Some things have to be let go.

There are some things that try to attach themselves to our lives that are just plain trash. Those things need to be kicked to the curb. Other things simply do not have a place in our lives and those things need to be let go. Paul tells us in verse 2 that we are to focus our thoughts on Heavenly things. While we do that, we are to avoid getting caught up in all the things in this world that would swamp our minds and hinder our walk. If we allowed the mind to focus on this world it would have no time to give itself to the things of God, Here in mentions Colossians Paul dangerous distractions that would hinder our walk if they were allowed to.

Father Lameck will be away on holiday during the month of January but will be back in office on Friday 7th February.

Our Three Sister Churches; Tattenhall, All Saints and Burwardsley continue to celebrate their festivals as one. Last year all these were well attended and attracted visitors and friends from around our villages. Here are the dates for the three churches in 2020.

Please note that this year we are having the Songs of Praise Service at Burwardsley Church at 10.30am and not 4.30pm as in previous years. There will be no 10:30am service at St Alban's that morning but the 8.00am service will take place as normal.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Day is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday.

Lent is the 40 days leading up to Easter. It is traditionally a time to mark the beginning of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins).

This year we have our Pancake Day Race on Tuesday **25**th **February**. The Pancake race will take place on Church Bank at 4.00pm. All children are invited to attend. This year, we will be able to provide some pans and pancakes so don't worry if you don't get time to make them or forget to bring them to school!

Rector's Supper 25th February 2020

It is that time of the year again when the Rector comes together with all parishioners for what is known as the 'Rector's Supper'. The idea is to have a meal together and after the meal, listen to an invited speaker. We are still in process of finalising the details so please check our website for further details nearer the time. All are welcome.

Ash Wednesday

This year we celebrate this service on **26th February**. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. Ash Wednesday is a significant day on the Christian calendar, denoting the beginning of the repentant period of Lent which precedes Easter. This is the day many Christians mark as the first day of Lent, the time of reflection and penitence leading up to Easter Sunday. As they "impose" or "dispense" the **ashes**, the priest reminds each Christian of Genesis 3:19: "For dust you are and to dust you shall return. There will be two Communion Services at Tattenhall Church with the imposition of ashes in the morning at 10.00am and 7.30pm. All our parishioners from the three parishes are invited to attend.

OBITUARY

William Robert Dunham, who passed away at home on 2nd November 2019, was born in Aylesbury in August 1939. After the war the family moved to Hampstead where Robert's father was a doctor. Following many years at Saint Paul's school, Hammersmith, Robert won a scholarship to Lincoln College, Oxford, where he studied Classics.

Changing direction, he trained as a doctor at Guy's Hospital, London, and married Kate with whom he had two sons, Keith and Mark. Subsequently he spent time at Exeter and Glasgow hospitals before taking up a post as consultant microbiologist at Arrowe Park Hospital on the Wirral. In 2000 he met Elaine and they married in 2003 so Robert came to live in Tattenhall. He became involved in village societies and was a member of Probus, U3A and the Bridge Club plus being a regular worshipper at Bickerton and Burwardsley churches. Robert was a very modest, intelligent person with a certain degree of eccentricity! He will be missed by many people, not least Elaine.

TATTENHALL LOCAL HISTORY 75 YEAR ERROR CORRECTED PRIVATE ROBERT THOMAS JENKINS

In September 2019 an article appeared in Tattenhall OnlIne regarding the correction of an error on WW11 plaque on the War Memorial, which was reworked. The background on Private Robert Thomas Jenkins was included. In addition to the error on the plaque a correction was also required to the "Roll of Honour" book which is kept in the Church.

After some searching a highly skilled calligrapher , Hilary Lewis, based in Sandbach was contacted and indicated that she would be able to help in doing what was thought to be virtually impossible; namely to correct the error so that it would not be noticed. For those of you with an interest in the process she describes it as follows;

"The first step in carrying out the correction to this fine Copperplate script was to revise the forms at the same size as the initials are written at, which is 6mm high. I can only marvel at the skill level of the original scribe, and the job was a pleasure to do on so many levels

Assessing the materials that would have been used wasn't difficult, it would have been gouache and a pointed nib by Joseph Gilot, of which I chose a vintage one, to match the style of the calligraphy.

The minimum amount of disturbance of the paper fibres was desirable and the unwanted areas of black were scraped away with a surgical scalpel. The fibres were burnished flat and finely ground gum sandarac dusted over the surface to minimise the chances of the gouache bleeding. After allowing the fresh ink to dry the final stage was to scrape away a remaining bit of black ink and burnish again."

Every one who has seen the correction agrees that it is invisible and it was carried out in time for the book to be returned to the Church for the Remembrance Service.

Our thanks go to Hilary Lewis of Sandbach for her immense skill and patience and to the Friends of St Albans who funded this work.

Having wished everyone a Happy New Year, at the beginning of the January meeting, a cheque for £1,398 was presented by Councillor Keeping to the NW Air Ambulance which represented the proceeds from the 'Squirrel Trail'. During Public Participation the Tattenhall Primary School Parent Teacher Friends Association (PTFA) requesting funding to support drainage of the school playing field. The school is expanding so having an adequate play and sports area is important. The work would need to be done in the summer of 2020 and the estimate for drainage is around £30k, towards which the PTFA have already raised £13K, but they would be looking for a donation from the CIL (Community Infrastructure levy). This topic was an agenda item during the meeting and after some initial debate it was concluded that further time was needed for reflection including considering other already identified projects that might benefit from the CIL levy and a decision was deferred until the February meeting.

Under planning, the council supported the application from Broadoak Farm for a camping site and touring caravans being consistent with commercial development outlined in the neighbourhood plan. It was noted that CWAC would no longer publish public comments on their portal which would inhibit councillors' ability to make informed planning decisions. It was suggested that any residents making comments on future applications should personally advise the Parish Clerk. Councillor Keeping reported that CWAC had finally published the housing monitor report and it was gratifying to note that the planners had now accepted that Tattenhall did not have a shortfall of houses to be built by 2030. This positive report meant that there was adequate 5

year housing and land supply and planners would have no grounds to override policies in the Neighbourhood Plan. It was unfortunate that the inclusion of the units at the retirement village had come too late to prevent the approval of 30 dwellings on the site adjacent to Chester Road. The Chester Road parking scheme had been approved and this would be implemented at no cost to the Parish Council. The speed limit changes were also finalised although final costings were awaited.

A resident raised a concern about pollution caused by HGVs parking near the school and leaving their engines running whilst visiting local shops. A poster competition was suggested to advertise the hazards of this practice, and local residents were encouraged to report any such transgressions by commercial vehicles to the parish clerk who would raise it with the respective companies.

The council had identified future priority projects. One of these projects was the improvement of the Spinney including constructing a pathway to the open space. Costs for this were being assessed (as well as possible grants). It was agreed that money raised through the Squirrel Trail and events in 2020 would be spent on local open spaces projects and, any money raised through the VE Day celebrations would be donated to the Royal British Legion. Before closing the council reviewed the 2020-2021 budget and suggested precept.

All residents are invited to attend the Parish Council meetings and can raise items in the 15 minute Open Forum at the start of the meeting. Meetings take place on the first Monday of the month in the Billiard Room at the Barbour Institute at 7.30pm.








Tattenhall Gardening Society's next meeting will be on **February 12th**, in the Barbour Institute.

Dear Residents

In outlying neighbouring villages there have been reports of three residential burglaries in which jewellery and a high value watch was taken, as well as a break in at a commercial property. There was also a break in to a catering vehicle which was relieved of cash, stock, and sadly a Charity box was taken.

Heritage Crime Arrests success

Over December there were two attempts of theft in separate incidents at Beeston Castle using metal detectors to try to find and dig up historic items. The Rural Crime Team have arrested two men in connection with heritage crimes committed at Beeston Castle and recovered a number of artefacts believed to have been taken by metal detectorists.
