#### From Father Lameck

# This month Father Lameck is exploring the season of Trinity

As the lockdown restrictions are gradually being lifted, I know that for some, this is the moment of walking around and enjoying the beauty of nature especially now during the season of Trinity. This is a season when the green plants dominate our surroundings in our country and the sign of life is virtually visible in our sight. As a church, this is also a moment when our Liturgical Year returns to the "Season of the Year" or "Ordinary Time. The Trinity for the church is also the longest period that covers almost half of the year. But what is the meaning of this season of Trinity all about? Pope Gregory 1X instituted Trinity Sunday in 828 CE. The day is known for being the only major Christian festival that celebrates a church doctrine rather than an event in its sacred history. It is dedicated to the Christian belief in the Trinity- Father, Son and Holy Spirit and falls on the Sunday following the Pentecost each year. The belief of one God in three elements is distinctive of the Christian faith.



Saint Patrick is famous for a few things, even in the general culture, for driving the snakes out of Ireland (only

metaphorically) and explaining the Trinity with the shamrock! He may or may not have done this, but the story almost belittles the importance of the Trinity to the ancient Celts.

The Trinity is how we describe God who is one and who is three persons. It's in the Trinity that we discover God is with us in the broken places of our lives as well as the whole places. It is in the Trinity we discover that God has sought us out, is seeking us out, and will always seek us out no matter what. It is in the Trinity that we realize that God is not a distant and judgmental God, but instead a loving God who walks with us daily in our trials and tribulations.

This God of the Trinity is walking the mountain path with us as we seek our waterfalls. This God of the Trinity is with us when we miss the sign and plunge ourselves off the path into dangerous areas. This God of the Trinity is with us when we wander back on course and find our heading after the pandemic. This God of the Trinity is with us when make our way down the mountain and share with the others the path of beauty and joy and love. It is in the Trinity that we see that God's very nature is the overflowing of love. It is an abundance of love so great that creation had to happen, and that creation had to be called "good."

May this season of Trinity bring love and restoration through the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.





# **Tattenhall Village Show**





#### Tattenhall & District Parish Council June Update Neighbourhood Plan & Design Code Review



Tattenhall & District As part of the Parish Council formed a committee in 2019 which has been undertaking a review of the Tattenhall & District Neighbourhood Plan which was adopted by Cheshire West & Chester Council

(CW&C) in June 2014 following the public referendum on the 24<sup>th</sup> October 2013 when the Plan received just over 95% support from residents of the Tattenhall area.

The Neighbourhood Plan is a planning policy document which is taken into consideration when CW&C decide all planning applications in the Parish Council area and is therefore very important in shaping what development can take place in Tattenhall, Newton-by-Tattenhall and Gatesheath.

The Neighbourhood Plan is described as a 'living Document' which was to be reviewed every 5 years during its lifetime which runs until 2030. The Committee which is made of Parish Councillors and residents has undertaken a large amount of work reviewing the Plan and its policies to check they are fit for purpose and up to date.

Review the committee has also began a review of the Village Design Statement, which was produced in 2009, and in line with current government policy is working to bring this



document up to date as a Design Code. The creation of the Design Code is being support by AECOM, the funding for which is provided by Locality, who manage grants for the creation and review of Neighbourhood Plans. We have also applied for funding to appoint an expert from Cheshire Community Action to help with the next stages of the Neighbourhood Plan review which will include consultation on any proposed changes to the Plan.

### **Nature Notes - July is Butterfly Month**

If you watched Springwatch on BBC in early June you would have seen a feature on Blue Tits and the consequences of



the very cold and late spring on their breeding success.

In my own breeding bird surveys I saw very few of them compared to normal springs. The explanation seems to be that there was a timing mismatch with oak trees coming into leaf much later than usual and the caterpillars which feed on them also developing late. The unfortunate Blue Tits which feed these caterpillars to their young bred at the usual time and therefore had so little food available for their chicks that many died in the nest from starvation — a real tragedy. It is possible that with climate



change such events may become more common.

On a happier note I have just seen my

first Painted Lady butterfly of the year (early June). These migrants come to us from North Africa, particularly Morocco, in a similar way to the more well-known migration of Monarchs in North America.

They may arrive here after successfully breeding in southern Europe. In some years they arrive in the UK in large numbers and are well worth looking out for.

It has now been established that adults which have bred here migrate south in autumn back to Africa, an amazing journey!



Also, July is a great month for other beautiful but resident butterflies such as Red Admiral, Small

Tortoiseshell, Comma and Gatekeeper.
