Happy New Year to you all!

The past two years have brought into our lives two phrases; "New Normal" and "Social distancing". These are phrases we hardly heard of a while ago, but now, they are part of our daily lives. As for the so called 'New Normal", I am yet to see if what we now see is it or if it is yet to come. As for the social distancing, I keep wondering how people measure this distance. Is it two metres or one, or somewhere in between, depending on where we are? It also depends on who we are with, for within households it doesn't apply. The general message remains that we need to avoid close contact with others and not to get close to the people around us.

But I was wondering if these new rules have enabled us to distance ourselves from sin and bring us closer to our God? For whilst we can be socially distanced from other humans, we cannot distance ourselves from The Creator. God wants His children near Him, as any earthly father would, and He has done everything necessary to bring us near. In our old sinful state we were "far off" from God, but now we have been " $made\ near\ by\ the\ blood\ of\ Christ"$. The barrier of our sin has been removed by the death of our Saviour and so we can be reconciled to God. By accepting what was done for us on the cross, we are "no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints and members of the household of God." (Ephesians 2 verses 13-19). The amazing grace of God has changed our distance into nearness!

There are times however when we do not feel very near to God, and we wonder why. We feel that God is far away. We have some good advice from James, one of the family brothers of the Lord Jesus, who wrote this; "Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you" (James 4.8).

I once read an article which said: "Does God seem far away? Who moved?" in many instances, God and His love are like the sun. The sun is always shining but the clouds can obscure it, can make things dull, and stop its warmth from reaching us. Clouds of doubt, of disappointment, of difficulty, can indeed come between our souls and God. We do not like clouds, and we cannot do much about them, but we can keep looking up through them until they pass – they always do! Our God is always there, waiting to receive us and bless us.

More good advice comes from Jude, another of the brothers of our Lord Jesus: "*Keep yourselves in the love of God"* (Jude v.21).

Father Lameck's Sabbatical



Our Rector, Fr Lameck Mutete, has loyally served as the Vicar of Tattenhall since 2004. He is well loved in the village and his kindness, welcome and laughter are known to us all. He was born in the village of Hera near Rusape in Zimbabwe, and we chose to support this village for our Advent appeal as Fr Lameck is spending his sabbatical leave there.

In recent years Zimbabwe has suffered from economic and political difficulties. It has gone from being the "Jewel in the Crown" of African education standards, to a country in crisis. Inflation is running at over 1000% (!) and what was free State provided education, now requires funds to be paid and schools are struggling to source basic equipment such as pens and paper, let alone electronic and IT

apparatus as supply chains are in chaos.

Educating girls is crucial to the long-term prosperity of families. An educated

mother will educate her family. Keeping girls

attending school regularly is essential. One of the biggest hurdles is "period poverty".

And so, with Fr Lameck visiting his homeland and family in January we aimed to ship out two drums of

items to help the schools there, St David's Primary School and Sanzaguru High School so they could arrive whilst Fr Lameck is there and he can oversee their distribution as we

offer help from one village to another.

Our Appeal was supported with incredible generosity by the community and businesses of Tattenhall and we gathered enough goods and had enough financial donation to ship not 2, but 4 packed drums to Zimbabwe. A huge thank you to The Tattenhall Brownies who came to help pack up the drums which are now on their way. Father Lameck has arrived in Hera and once the drums arrive he has promised to send further updates and photos to keep us posted. Thank you to everyone who has donated and helped with this project.





KEEPING ST ALBAN'S CHURCH ALIVE

REFURBISHMENT OF THE BELLS

The Community of Tattenhall has the great fortune to have a Church that holds the oldest dated bells in Cheshire. The tower contains six bells, three of which are over six hundred years old and the most recent installed in 1904.

Like all Church bells they need to be regularly maintained otherwise they will corrode and crack then will be lost for ever. The last time any significant work was carried out, apart from painting and routine maintenance was over 50 years ago.

We have approval for a project to totally refurbish the bells and the work is planned for the second quarter of 2022. We have identified and approved a contractor to carry out the exceptionally demanding and skilled work. The company is based in the West Country and I took the opportunity to visit his factory for the first time during a recent visit to Bath and Exeter.

An incredible visit – certainly for a layman such as myself and this is a brief summary.

The factory is based on a well established set of industrial units on a farm in the depths of Somerset. It is at the two extremes of industrial engineering with heavy engineering combined with fine turning and milling on a gram scale to tune the bells.

A bit of background – did you know that the oldest bell is from five thousand years ago and was made of pottery. This was changed with time to metal and I understand that the composition and ratio of metals are virtually the same today as it was a thousand years ago. When I was there I saw a bell nearly a thousand years old.

The key skilled workers are themselves amongst the leading bell ringers in the country with unbelievably finely tuned ears. They have amazing talent.

Whilst there I saw a half tonne bell mounted on a milling machine with small pieces being ground off then the bell

retuned which was determined by ear supplemented with a computerised sound system. This iterative process continues to achieve perfection – incredible. I understand there are at least five tones, the initial strike followed by four resonating nodes.

Once the bells have been tuned they have to be married in to the clapper for size, shape and composition and once this is completed the bell has to be effectively hung. These processes are sciences in themselves.

Once this programme of work is completed the refurbished bells should be operational for 50 to 100 years.

The intention is to leave a secure legacy of bells and bell ringers for future generations.

If you wish to contribute to this legacy it can be done as follows

- Train to become an adult bell ringer.
- Train to become part of a planned junior team.
- Contribute to the cost of the bells refurbishment.
- Sponsor the project by naming a clapper and this will last for 50 to 100 years.

In December, because of concerns about the spread of the Omicron variant, the Parish Council held an informal meeting on Zoom.

Although decisions could not be taken at this meeting, Councillors were able to have discussions on a number of topics.

Two members of the public had put their names forward to be co-opted to the Parish Council. A decision on this had to be deferred to the next formal meeting and both candidates would be informed.

The Clerk had delegated powers to submit comments on planning applications to the planning authority. Two applications were discussed and comments would be sent to CWaC.

The Parish Council was considering a Management Plan for Glebe Meadow and Barnfield. The Clerk had contacted several companies and was waiting for responses. Transition Tattenhall would be asked if one of their representatives would join the working group.

In relation to the flooding of the village in the previous summer, Tattenhall had been offered a number of sandbags for emergency use. These would be sited at the back of the Barbour Institute on pallets.

Councillors had been engaged in trying to find a way for the Community Room at the school to fulfil its purpose as a space to be hired by groups. No-one had come forward to be involved in the administration of the room and it was felt that the working group had reached an impasse. It was suggested that the Parish Council should ask CWaC to carry out a review of the situation.

Further discussion would be held early in the New Year.

Rents for the Gatesheath Allotments would be frozen for 2022/23.

It was proposed that the January meeting be held on 4th January because of the Bank Holiday.

DETERMINATION AND DEDICATION BEATS DWINDLING!

Like so many other things Covid affected the "Nine Lessons and Carols Service" last December!

A few things happened and the Church Choir which should have been joined by Tattenhall Singers suddenly wasn't! Also, in comparison with

St Alban's Bell Tower



We all know the bell tower well, we walk past it, listen to the bells and glance at the clock as it marks the hours. The tower is a familiar landmark in Tattenhall, but how much do we know about it?

The tower is much older than the rest of the current church building that is standing today and which was rebuilt in 1869 under the direction of John Douglas who was responsible for much of the architectural design of Chester including the clock bridge.

The 1869 church that stands today was rebuilt on the original foundations which date to the time of the Norman Conquest (1066). But St Alban's could indeed be even older than that with evidence of Roman settlement and a possible shrine room having been found by archeological investigators in previous years and suggesting the possibility that a place of worship has existed on this site for nearly two thousand years.

The tower that we see today was built around 1500 in the time of Henry VII. It appears it was finished by 1514 as Rafe Huxley of Tattenhall requested in his will of that date that, "my body be buried in the bell house of the parish of Tattenhall."

The tower houses six bells of huge historical significance. Three were cast in 1596 by Henry Oldfield II and are the oldest dated bells in Cheshire. They are inscribed; "JESUS BE OUR SPEED", " GOD SAVE OUR QUEEN" (A dedication to Elizabeth I) and "GOD SAVE HIS CHURCH". The later bells were cast in 1710.

As one of the highest buildings in the area during The Civil War, and leading up to the Battle of Rowton Heath (1645), it seems the tower was of strategic significance and it appears that the indentations on the southern side of the tower that are visible today were caused by musket fire around that time.

The roof underwent a major redesign in 1832. Until then it had a slated square spire topped by a weather vane. However, it was in a dilapidated state as was the main part of the church) and it was demolished and replaced by the flat roof we know today. Despite this, the tower has aged well. It is built of red sandstone blocks and the Mason's mark can still be seen on some of them today. Although the tower does have a slight lean to the west of 2 degrees it is very stable and with continuing monitoring should last a few more hundreds of years.

After a fundraising campaign to provide much needed maintenance to the bells and parts of the tower, The PCC have been able to instruct a specialist in ancient bell preservation. The work is scheduled to take place this year with apologies for the necessary scaffolding and hiatus in bell ringing whilst this is taking place.

February 2nd Candlemas: The feast of the presentation of Christ in the Temple

The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple celebrates an early episode in the life of Jesus. It falls between the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on January 25th, and the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter on February 22nd. The event is described in the Gospel of Luke, 2:22-40. According to the gospel, Mary and Joseph took the baby Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth to complete Mary's ritual purification after childbirth, and to perform the redemption of the firstborn, in obedience to the Law of Moses, Leviticus 12, Exodus 13:12-15.The last three Sundays in February are known by the strange names they bear in the Prayer Book-Septugesima, Sexagesima and Quinquagesima. Our today's church calendar call these Sundays in February 'Sundays before Lent.' And this is a reminder that, as the first shoots of spring begin to show, the church year turns from the contemplation of the birth of Christ, and begins to prepare for the solemn observance of his passion and triumph in Holy Week and Easter.


