Father Lameck's Message

Celebrating the Feast of St. Alban



Alban is believed to have been a Romano-British citizen of the third century in the Roman city of Verulamium, in the valley below the present Cathedral. The earliest versions of his history say that he gave shelter to a stranger fleeing from persecution. This was a Christian priest, originally unnamed but later called Amphibalus in the re-telling of the story.

Alban was so moved by the priest's faith and courage that he asked to be taught more about Christianity, then still a forbidden religion. Before long the authorities came to arrest the fugitive priest. But Alban, inspired by his newfound faith, exchanged clothes with Amphibalus, allowing him to escape. Alban was then arrested and brought before the city magistrate. When asked to identify himself he declared: 'I am called Alban and I worship and adore the true and living God, who created all things'. The magistrate ordered that Alban should receive the punishment due to the priest. He was brought out of the town and up the hillside to the site of execution where he was

beheaded. Despite escaping, Amphibalus too was later arrested and martyred at Redbourn, a few miles away.

Alban was probably buried in the Roman cemetery now located by modern archaeological digs to the south of the present Cathedral. Alban is honored as the first British martyr, and his grave on this hillside quickly became a place of pilgrimage. The red rose, in particular has come to be a special symbol of the saint reflecting the words of an ancient prayer: 'Among the roses of the martyrs, brightly shines Saint Alban.' Alban is a saint of the undivided church, a saint for all Christians. His welcome to a persecuted stranger was a powerful example of courage, compassion and hospitality.

St Alban is still with us in the Communion of Saints, and in this sacred place we worship God with him and ask his prayers. For over 1700 years, pilgrims have prayed on this hillside, many on or near St Alban's Day, 22 June, when his story is celebrated and re-enacted.

The Christmas market and tractor event last year was a wonderful sight and a huge success, and we hope to expand and improve on this truly magical evening.

JANE'S JOTTINGS

Whatever happened to white toothpaste? Whatever brand of toothpaste I buy these days it is blue or green and one was black. A Year in View at St Alban's

In April every Church of England Church is required to hold an annual meeting to elect church roles and to report on what has happened in the previous twelve months. St Alban's is a busy, thriving church that provides a warm welcome and works to be the spiritual and pastoral hub of the village. Here are some of the highlights of this year.

The Remembrance Service, was very well attended and is an important occasion in the village. Thanks to David Bish from The British Legion for his organisation. **The** Christmas Eve Crib Service was popular with young families. Thanks to Jean Griffiths for leading this. The church supports **Christian Aid Week** and in 2023 raised £618.30 through the 'no collect envelopes' and a plant sale which was held on Rectory Drive. Our Breakfast Service at the monthly **Sunday Songs of Praise** is very popular with thanks to Dee and Steve. The 2023 Advent Appeal collected donations of reading books, educational materials and girls' items for our link school in Zimbabwe. Five drums of donations have been shipped. We are very grateful. Through financial donations and support from Tattenhall, the education of the children in Hera continues to flourish. A new unit of classrooms, and a literacy centre supplied with the book donations, is due to open this year. Our outreach initiatives continue to be

Our outreach initiatives continue to be popular, especially **"Food with Friends"** on the first Friday of the month and our Wednesday morning **Coffee Drop-in** and monthly **Coffee and Quiz**. We are registered as a Warm Space and we are

supporting Transition Tattenhall with the setting up of **The Free Pantry**. A **food collection** for The Trussell Trust in Chester took place in October.

<u>Fundraising</u>

Raising funds continues to be an enormous task. We are striving to embrace digital giving. Look out for our **donation QR code** in church and in the magazine.

In July **The Church Village Fete** welcomed guests from Zimbabwe who brought a lively atmosphere with music and food. The church is grateful to the local businesses and volunteers who donated gifts and time to ensure this event was so successful and popular.

The Community Room continues to gain in popularity as a space for local meetings. The **Opal Club**, **U3A**, **Bridge** Club, and Loss Café are amongst the groups who regularly meet there. Thank you to Dee Mason for managing the booking system so efficiently. The church enjoyed "Autumn Antics" in October. Raising funds, increasing the profile of the church and celebrating Harvest Festival. We enjoyed a concert by Chester Male Voice Choir, a cake stall in the churchyard, a pumpkin patch, children's activities, and an open weekend for our Harvest Festival with a display of flowers and produce and lunch. Thank you to all for the tremendous efforts and to Jane Richards for leading the organisation. The Friends of St Alban's have been helpful in providing funding for maintenance projects this year. They have offered valuable financial support to ensure that the Church, its contents and the Churchyard continue to be well maintained.

Volunteers

St Alban's is blessed with a small band of dedicated volunteers. Volunteers work tirelessly as sidesmen, flower arrangers, refreshment providers, laundry doers, administrators and vergers at weddings, funerals, and baptisms. An enormous thank you to everyone who gives time and skill with a smile and a happy heart for the benefit of St Alban's and our parish. If you would like to join any of the volunteer groups, please get in touch. New members are always welcome.

Holy Dusters are The St Alban's Cleaning group, and has been up and running for almost three years. This is a team of around twelve volunteers. They meet once a month, after the Wednesday 10am service, on either the first or second Wednesday of the month. If anyone would like to join this friendly band of cobweb warriors, then you would be most welcome. Tea and cake and dusters are provided. Not all members of the Holy Dusters are regular church attenders, but they all share in the joy of keeping our church beautiful and sharing time together. (Patricial Morris-01829 770272)

The Churchyard Team continues to work maintaining the churchyard as a safe and pleasant environment. The gates have been painted, dangerous trees removed, gutters cleared, paths cleaned, and constant mowing takes place to keep the churchyard tidy and accessible. In consideration of our wildlife and the intrinsic organic nature of the land around the churchyard, strategic areas of unmown meadow have been left. There has also been considerable planting of wildflowers to encourage pollinators and native wildlife. Striking a balance between managing an environmentally sensitive area and ensuring the churchyard is a safe and pleasant place to visit is a constant consideration. Thank you to every one of the team who has dedicated time and skill to keeping the environs of our church such a beautiful place. Many of this team are not regular church attenders but are passionate about the upkeep the spiritual centre of Tattenhall.

The Bell Tower Team had a hiatus of ringing whilst the bells were repaired, the

team celebrated the reinstatement with a **Tower Open Day** in September. The bells were missed in their absence and the village was pleased to hear them ring out again. Thanks to Carolyn Vickers (Bell Captain) and the team. New members and enquiries are always welcome.

Flower Arrangers as ever, have done a magnificent job of dressing the church for weddings, funerals and festivals. Of noteworthy mention were the harvest Christmas and Easter displays. Thank you to Sue Orme, Gill Friswell and team.

<u>Music</u>

During the year both the piano (thanks to TMS) and the organ have received attention to ensure the quality of the instruments. The church has been the venue for Tattenhall **Music Society** events and the Christmas Carol Service welcomed the Tattenhall Singers augment the St Alban's Choir. We are grateful to the choir members and organists who lead the congregation. Thanks to Neil Friswell for leading the choir and to Jean Griffiths for organising the **Songs of Praise** Services.

Fabric Report

There have been many important projects to ensure the preservation, restoration and maintenance of the church and churchyard. These include outside work such as the replacement of the leaking oil tank, fitting external motion sensors, fixing vandalised light bollards, repairing the lightning conductor, painting the gates, drainage repairs, removing dead trees. Internally, there has been work done to modify the lectern, repair the pulpit and fit a handrail. The discovery of rotten floorboards has resulted in a major repair and restoration project. Thanks to Linda Davenport for overseeing the huge amount of administration and paperwork involved to ensure the compliance for a listed building was efficiently handled.

Bell Tower Update

St Alban's has 6 bells 3 of which are the oldest dated bells in Cheshire with the date of their casting cast in them. They required urgent refurbishment. The costs were supported by individual donors and grants. Thanks to everyone. New clappers have now been installed. The most difficult job of drilling out the cast in iron stumps was successful. There was some evidence of these stumps starting to rust, which if left

in had the potential to crack the bells. New gale breakers were installed ensuring improved resistance to the elements. While our bells were out of action we continued our practices at Handley. Following the completion of the work we rang a quarter peal in celebration an enjoyed the smoother

feel of the 'go' of the bells. We also held a **Tower Open Day** when those who wished could have a conducted tour up to the bells and learn a little of their history. During the year we rang for 3 weddings and with help from Jason Orme played a recording of bells for a wedding while the bells were out of action. The ringers also rang for the coronation in Handley. During 2023 five new ringers have started, some starting at Handley. All are progressing and ringing with us on Sundays. **Communication**

The website redesign and update is complete and we are grateful to Eric Elson for this. **The Parish News Magazine** is now established to be published and distributed six times a year. Thank you to Pat Black for

editing duties and to Dee Mason for running the advertising. The aim remains for the magazine to be self-funded and this is continually under review as printing costs rise and advertising diminishes. Thank you to the whole team involved in writing articles, editing, collating and bundling and distributing the magazine.
